Preserving Culture through Skilled Artistry: Maring's Mini Museum



Meghalaya - a state rich in culture and tradition, a heritage passed down to us by our forefathers that defines our identity. Preserving our culture through tradition is the responsibility of every individual, as it gives us a sense of connection and oneness. It is crucial to safeguard our cultures, histories, and heritage for obvious reasons. However, culture can mean different things to different people. For Mr. Rani Maring, culture is about passing on the traditions inherited from his forefathers.

Rani Maring, known as 'the man of many talents,' is a farmer, skilled artisan in bamboo and wood handicrafts, luthier, percussionist, and carpenter. He is also a husband and a father to eight children, hailing from the small village of Pahambir Them, Nongpoh, Ri-Bhoi District. Maring is a visionary with a passion for preserving his culture, the Bhoi culture, as



he foresees the impact of cross-culture influences. He expresses his commitment to cultural preservation through his skillful activities, which are evident in his Mini Museum located at his residence.

Since childhood, Maring has loved observing and helping his elders, and in the process, he has gained expertise in the tradition of making traditional houses out of bamboos and thatch. So far, Maring has constructed many traditional houses within Ri-Bhoi District and a few outside the district. Maring and his family live in a traditional house constructed by himself, as he feels connected to his roots.

Maring's interest in music led him to become a luthier and a percussionist. His vision included crafting instruments such as ka Duitara (a 4-stringed instrument resembling a guitar), Sitar, ka Ksing (a percussion instrument made of wood, leather, and parchment), ka Bom (a percussion instrument made of softwood and leather), Tangmuri (a tube with seven holes), and Maringod (an indigenous violin). Once people learned about Maring's skills, they started approaching him and placing orders for musical instruments. According to Maring, to date, he has sold 4 ksings, 5 boms, 5 maringods, 3 tangmuris, and countless duitaras.



The same interest and love for music guided him to participate in many cultural programmes organized by the Lyngdoh Raids and many others. Infact, Maring is amongst those who revived the Shad Sajer amongst the Raid Nonglyngdoh of Hima Khad-Ar Lyngdoh amidst intense scrutiny and criticism. The dance, at the time, had not been performed in the region for over two decades, presumably due to a conflict with Christianity. Maring, however, believes it was a fuss over manufactured differences, and vows to revive as much of the old traditions as memory can recollect – the Shad Chut Wait, Shad Rah Kynthei and other dances of the Hima Khad-Ar Lyngdoh and Ri Bhoi.



In addition to making traditional houses and musical instruments, Maring also possesses skills in handicrafts, which he has been involved in for quite some time. His crafted work allows him to generate additional income to support his family, as relying solely on farming has become challenging. Maring's craftwork includes decorative items, cups, baskets, ka pdung (a traditional storage container), ka prah (a winnowing tray), hats, and other items. Maring's vision was born 20 years ago when he visited U Soso Tham and the Mawlai Museum. The visit to the museum inspired and motivated him to execute his vision. Maring wholeheartedly carried out his work on his own land, which spans about 6 acres. What makes Maring's work even more interesting is that he incurs minimal expenses on raw materials, as bamboo is readily available on his own land. Maring had already planted bamboo as the first step in accomplishing his vision, making it a sustainable and cost-effective source of material for his work.

Maring mentioned that he did not receive any formal training for his artwork. Instead, he learned through observation, teachings from his forefathers, his love for his roots and identity, and above all, believing in himself. However, just a few months ago, he attended a training program organized by The Dakti Craft, an art organization from Shillong, to further



polish his skills. Currently, Maring is collaborating with The Dakti organization to outsource his artwork, indicating his commitment to continuously improving and expanding his craft through collaborations and opportunities for further learning.

Mr. Rani Maring received financial support from Prime Meghalaya, an institute of entrepreneurs that focuses on market access, skills development, technology, and credit linkages. He was issued a cheque for Rs 5,00,000/- on 19th March, 2021. With the financial assistance from Prime Meghalaya, Mr. Maring was able to start the construction work of his Mini Museum and began displaying his artwork. This support has enabled him to further pursue his passion and showcase his art to a wider audience, highlighting the positive impact of entrepreneurship and financial assistance in promoting and preserving traditional art forms.

Understanding the importance of preserving culture through tradition, Maring and the elders formed a society of 20 members naming it as 'kyntiewlang Raid Nonglyngdoh.The society under Maring Leadership is formed with a purpose of preserving culture by imparting practical training based on all art work displayed at Maring's Mini Museum.As per Maring vision,the trainings are to be conducted at his residence where a separate traditional house is constructed only for the purposes of trainings and workshops. Though, Kyntiewlang Raid Nonglyndoh society, is merely at its birth stage but what matter is their long-term goal in imparting traditional teaching to the youth from different Raid's and to those who are interested.

Therefore, Maring in his 60's is a living example for the younger generation as they are can inculcate the teaching gain from him and many others who contribute in their own unique style for the preservation of culture and tradition.





For the Khasi-Jaintia Region the number of application received in Phase 2 (batch 1) is 656, of which total verification/boundary mapping completed by VCF's/GFA's is 479 and the remaining to be verified is 177 (as of 12th April 2023).



For the Garo Region the number of application received in Phase 2 (batch 1) is 403, of which total verification/boundary mapping completed by VCF's/GFA's is 365 and the remaining to be verified is 38 (as of 12th April 2023).





Installation at South Garo Hills

On April 5th and 6th, 2023, the Green Energy team embarked on a journey from Tura to Rongcheng village, which is the remotest village in the South Garo Hills district, to install a hydroger. After travelling for 4 and a half hours by vehicle, the team trekked for 5 hours to reach the village, where they stayed overnight before returning to Tura the next day.



Rongcheng, being one of the remote villages in the region, lacks proper road connectivity and mobile network coverage. Moreover, the village currently has no access to electricity. However, the installation of the hydroger by the Green Energy team will bring electricity for household lighting to all 46 households in the village.

CENTRE FOR BIO RESOURCES (MEGH AROMA MISSION)



The Megh Aroma Mission of INR is an organization that is dedicated to promoting the use and cultivation of medicinal and aromatic plants in the state. The Medicinal and Aromatic plants have numerous health benefits and can be used in various industries such as pharmaceuticals, cosmetics, and food.

To achieve their goal of promoting these plants, the Megh Aroma Mission conducted an awareness program in Umtong village, which is located in the Mawkynrew block of the East Jaintia Hills district. The program aimed to educate the local community about the various types of medicinal and aromatic plants that can be found in the region, as well as their uses and benefits.

During the program, Project scientist Dr. Hygina Siangbood from the Megh Aroma Mission provided detailed information on the cultivation, harvesting, and processing of these plants. Meghalaya Livelihoods And Access To Markets Proiect



The Megha – LAMP Retreat was successfully conducted from the 3rd to 5th April 2023 in Dooars, West Bengal, with the aim of strengthening and informing the staff to meet daily targets by eliminating the outdated approach of working solely as separate components. The first day consisted of an internal meeting attended by the Deputy Project Director (DPD), Senior Managers (SM), and District Managers (DPM), who provided a detailed briefing on the Annual Work Plan Budget (AWPB) for Financial Year 2023-2024. On the second day, each district team developed their training budgets based on the value chain and presented on the third day. It is worth mentioning that Megha- LAMP, an IFAD funded project, has received a two-year extension till December 2024.



On April 5th, Seed Secure Meghalaya's CPRS program provided farmers in Pyndenglitha village with ARCs of potato and a hands-on training session on inputs distribution.

A visit was made to Nangrime IVCS Ltd and Rengsinpara IVCS Ltd in Tikrikilla Block to collect Actual Receipt forms and to see the foundation of the ginger machine shed. Interactions were also held with Shri Dipin V Panicker, marketing lead under IVCS and CMC level, to discuss the business plan and the repayment of the CMC working capital to the IVCS.

The 3rd Batch of Business Correspondents Training for IVCS was successfully held at IIBM in Guwahati from April 3rd to 5th, 2023. The participants comprised of IVCS from West Garo Hills, South Garo Hills, and West Jaintia Hills Districts.



The DPMU, West Garo Hills team conducted field visits to monitor ongoing constructions under Challenge Fund. These include an irrigation canal in Chibongapal, benefiting 30 households for paddy cultivation, a water reservoir check dam with a retaining wall in Balalgre, benefiting the entire village, a water tank cum mini check dam in 35 Mangdugre, benefiting households, and an intervention in Sadolpara that will benefit 30 households and in Wangala.



A Food Processing Training program focused on locally available fruits and vegetables was conducted at Singimari Village in Selsella Block, as part of the VTF (NRM) initiative. The program was delivered to entrepreneurs identified by the project, with Mrs. Senoritha Sangma serving as the project's master trainer.



SPMU and DPMU West Garo Hills District organized a meeting at Bakdil in Tura to discuss ginger and cashew production, and Farmers' Markets in the Western Region. Participants from ISC&ED staff and market committees of Garo Hills shared feedback and estimated budgets for market layouts.
